- North Georgia is the center of Georgia's apple industry.

FRUIT

- Today nearly half of the peanut crop in the United States is grown in Georgia.
- George Washington Carver is considered the father of the peanut.
- They are four main types of peanuts: Runner, Spanish, Valencia and Virginia. Runner peanuts are primarily grown in Georgia.
- Georgia leads the nation in pecan production, averaging 88 million pounds each year.
- Pecan trees are members of the hickory tree family and are prized for their lumber to build beautiful furniture.
- Pecans provide essential nutrients like oleic acid, which can help lower "bad" LDL cholesterol levels.

- Corn is grown in every county in Georgia, making it the most widely grown crop in the state.
- Georgia tomatoes are available much of the year, from mid-May through mid-November.
- Vidalia Onions can only be grown in twenty counties within the State of Georgia.
- Georgia Grown bell peppers have very little fat, no cholesterol and no sodium but are an excellent source of vitamin C and A.
- Ninety-five percent of a cucumber is made of water.

- Georgia currently has 226 dairy farms and is home to over 86,000 dairy cows.
- The total amount of milk produced in Georgia in 2014 amounted to 196 million gallons.
- Georgia has three commercial milk processing plants located in Atlanta, Braselton, and Lawrenceville.
- The first dairy cows arrived in Georgia with James Edward Oglethorpe, the founder of the colony, in the early 1700s.

Cotton

- A bale of Georgia cotton weighs about 480 pounds.
- A bale of cotton can produce 215 pairs of jeans and 313,600 \$100 dollar bills.
- The small flower buds on a Georgia cotton plant are known as "squares."
- The seed from one bale of cotton produces enough oil to cook nearly 6,000 snack sized bags of potato chips.

- There are 151 wood processing mills in Georgia, including 12 pulp mills, 85 sawmills and 54 other mills.
- When it rains in Georgia, two out of three raindrops falls on a forest. That's a lot of forest!
- Georgia's forests are one of the most significant factors affecting our water quality and quantity.

Beef Cattle

- Georgia-raised cattle descend from stock in Europe, Africa and South America.
- Because cattle are grown in all 159 counties of Georgia, the beef industry has a large impact on the state's economy (estimated at more than \$2 billion).
- More than 95 percent of all yearlings are shipped to the Midwest, where they are raised to finish weights.
- Every year consumers spend more than half of their meat budgets on beef, making beef the consumer meat of choice.
